Antique Organ for Sale

The Huntsville History Center has a small antique pump organ for sale. We do not have room for it in the new Town Hall History Center office. The organ is one of the first pump organs in Huntsville and was used in the old white church in the children's room. The organ was built by the Newman Brother's Company in Chicago, Illinois sometime between 1880-1920. After being used by the Church it was restored by Wayne Devereux, a well-known organist in the Ogden area, for the lady who purchased the organ from the Church. Culinary Water System Update

June was a significant month for our culinary water system. The first major event was a result of our continued monitoring of the area where we suspected Cfinally brought success as we detected a spot where water began surfaracing. Following this discovery we dug, found, and repaired a second major leak within a month's time! There are photos and further information on the town website under Residents/Culinary Water. The second event was the arrival of backordered parts for our main line pressure reducing valve. We were able to perform maintenance on the entire pressure control subsystem and now have reduced our in-town system pressure to the 60-psi range, which is within the recommended range for residential homes. You may have already noticed the decrease in you water pressure. We know that extra high water pressure is hard on older pipes and may be adding to our substantial leak problems in Town. Due to this we have decided to decrease our water pressure to the recommended 60 psi. This July, the Town Council will be reviewing a Zion's Bank culinary water system financial data study that will be used to determine the amount of a needed raise in the culinary water rates. Information will be made available on the Huntsville Town website.

Resident Parking Passes

We are now in the summer season and the Huntsville Resident Parking Passes are required if you are parking in the "Parking by Permit Only" areas of Town. This would be at the Pineview access area on the corner of 200 S and 7800 E, and most other areas west of 7300 E. Residents of Huntsville Town may park in these areas if they display their residential parking permit. Every residence in Town may have two parking permits. You may pick these up at the Town Hall if you don't have one. The parking fine for parking in these areas without the permit is \$75. Residential parking permit holders may also obtain annual or temporary guest passes.

DWR License Required to Visit Middle Fork or Causey

H.B. 309 is a new state law requiring anyone 18 years or older to have a valid hunting, fishing or combination license to access the Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) in Middle Fork and Causey Reservoir. Since this is a new law DWR officials are not issuing citations this year but will start in 2026. WMAs are primarily funded by the sales of Utah hunting, fishing and combination licenses and by federal excise taxes (which are paid on hunting and fishing equipment) — typically, state taxes do not pay for them. All license sales go toward conservation in Utah, so having a current license is a way to support wildlife conservation, land acquisition, management and habitat restoration at your favorite WMA and statewide. The area of Causey that is affected is the Skullcrack hiking area. Fishing and paddling on Causey Reservoir is not affected.
